I loved it all and still do, but whatever the location one aspect has always fascinated me. I cannot pass a junction, large or small, without gazing along the watery arm thus revealed, to some far off horizon, and wondering where does that go? Sometimes the rewards are pretty ordinary - another junction perhaps, or some dreary factory site, but occasionally, just occasionally mind, your efforts are rewarded with a real gem of a terminus.

I recall our first Birmingham trip, where after a long day's locking up the North Stratford and Worcester and Birmingham canals, we arrived weary (and a little apprehensive) slap bang in the heart of Britain's second city.

Brindley Place welcomed us with its Bohemian atmosphere of pubs, shops and cafes nestling down below, and almost hidden from, the frantic rush-hour streets above. Down there all was calm and serene, a wondrous place and a trip well worth making. Other local tourist destinations I can recommend include Coventry basin, Loughborough Wharf and the Great Northern basin (top of the Erewash Canal) and there are many others to find for the inquisitive boater, walker or cyclist.

So where is he going with all this I hear you ask? Well, down at Syston there is a junction, as we all know. I used to wonder how many passers-by gaze up the River Wreake and asked themselves, where does that go? Through the wonders of the internet and, more specifically the Chairman's Gmail account, I am starting to find out that a great deal of people are asking that same question. Our job here at MOWS is to turn that fascination into desire to visit the terminus and support our scheme to open up the river corridor to make Melton the must-see destination.

So local tourism chiefs, listen up. **Melton-on-Sea** for the weekend anyone?

At a meeting of the River Soar and Grand Union Canal Partnership held on 15 January, provisional plans for the marina and visitor centre development following the renovation of the old Toll House and the Isolation Hospital buildings, were presented, discussed and approved.

Application for planning approval can now proceed, together with talks with the Canal and Rivers Trust and the Environment Agency.
