Attention Walkers!

Avid readers may remember that last summer I walked the proposed Oakham Canal Trail from Oakham to Melton, the Wreake Valley Way from Melton to Syston, and continued on into Leicester through Watermead Park. At the time I said I was going to revise our current walk leaflets ready for this



summer. Sadly, work commitments have, in part, prevented me from doing so, but there are also some developments in the Wreake Valley and to the north of Oakham which might impact both routes. In short, I am trying to work through these issues so that we can make sure our new leaflets are as up to date as possible.

Two things struck me though:

Firstly, this is a fantastic three day walk. Leaving Oakham fresh for a long day's walk to Melton on day one. A shorter walk on day two to Thrussington. Finally, a morning walk into Leicester on day three, with an afternoon return by train. As a group I think we should do more to encourage maintenance of the route, promote it and, if possible, have it properly signposted. Perhaps there are members out there who live local to the route and may be interested in "adopting" a section?

Secondly, the mobile media age is upon us. I have seen some great work by others where we could make more of this technology. From simple mobile versions of the leaflets, to links to geocaching sites, and interactive walks where we could add information about the history of the waterways at specific locations. If anyone is interested in working with me on such projects, or has experience in these areas, I would really like to hear from you.

If you or your family are interested in walking all or part of these walks in the summer, I will be running some guided tours, pointing out the sights and throwing in some historical detail along the way! Volunteers Clean Up After Doris

Our society volunteers have been hard at work on the river around Melton in the aftermath of Storm "Doris".



On a regular Sunday work party in March, they discovered a blown down tree that was completely blocking the waterway. The tree had fallen in the Sysonby area and was causing a build-up of debris brought down by recent heavy rain. This was acting as a dam and, had it been left, could have resulted in higher water levels and local flooding.

The group set-to using "Badger", one of their workboats, to get close enough to start cutting the monster into pieces to forge a way past and release the build-up of pressure.

A spokesman for the group said that unfortunately sunken trees are likened to icebergs in that the majority of the structure is under the water and that the volunteers would have to return soon with their heavy-duty winch to raise the tree to enable further removal to take place.
