Update on The Oakham Canal Green Corridor

MOWS, and our partners at the Oakham Angling Society and Sustainable Land Trust, have now held two project meetings with Rutland County Council to progress our ideas for the Green Corridor. The Council continue to be fully supportive of our plans, but this is a long-term project with many challenges ahead. We have, however, reached the important step of going public with our ideas and gaining further support.

For those of you unfamiliar with the concept, let me provide a few details:

The Green Corridor will run initially from the north of Oakham town centre to the Oakham Enterprise Park (formerly Oakham Prison) and be based upon the remains of the Oakham Canal. The project aims to:

- Improve the existing wetland habitats
- Manage the existing woodlands
- Create new accessible rights of way and woodland walks
- Improve the existing angling facilities

Effectively we are looking to create a 2 mile-long linear park with the remains of the Oakham Canal at its heart. Our vision is for extensive community engagement in the project – a facility for the people with the people involved in its creation.

Wreake Valley Way

- Explore the Wreake Valley and learn about the former Melton Mowbray Navigation between Melton and Syston
- Operates on request in May, June and September
- Walks depart at 09:00 from the Boat Inn, opposite Melton Borough Council Offices, and are approx. 16 miles (shorter options are also available)
- Allow 8-9 hours for the full walk, including time for a lunch stop

Oakham Canal Trail

- Learn about the history of the Oakham canal ... and its possible future on this short walk north of Oakham
- Operates on request in July and August (weather permitting)
- Walks depart at 10:00 and 13:00 from Oakham Church Street Car Park and are approx. 5 miles
- Allow 2½ 3 hours, including time for a refreshment stop at The Potting Shed café

- Please wear appropriate clothing and footwear. Walks can be muddy after wet weather!




We're Batty About Bat Boxes


We are seeking members views on one of these three projects:

Annual General Meeting 2018

Our AGM was held on Saturday 17 November at The Sysonby Knoll (Best Western) Hotel, Asfordby Road, Melton Mowbray.

The chairman's report for the year included:

- Melton distributor road
- New Grove School area
- Boats and boat dock planning application and grants
- Social media Facebook
- Tool appeal

He also gave a summary from committee member, Paul Dadford, who was unable to attend. Paul has been meeting with Rutland County Council regarding his project for an Oakham Canal Green Corridor (see page 2 for update). Last year Paul recruited Footpath Rangers, who have mapped the locations of all the gates, stiles and way-markers along the Wreak Valley Way and intends to produce a more detailed guide. He is also planning another series of guided walks this year (also see page 2 for further details).

The Treasurer's report showed a small profit overall, despite subscriptions/donations being down on last year and a loss on merchandise. This was balanced by expenses being lower. Last year these were higher due to the dock planning application.

Committee numbers stayed the same, with the re-election of three members who wished to remain on the committee. There was one resignation during the year from Hugh Butler, but this was filled by co-opted society member and volunteer, Jerry Filor, who was voted on to the committee.

There was a brief open discussion and at the end of the meeting the chairman intended to show a film made by The Canal & River Trust, entitled "Water Adds Value". There were a few technical problems, but eventually most of the audience were able to see it ... if not hear it! If you weren't there (or even if you were), you can look at this via YouTube – well worth a look-see.

Refreshments were available after the meeting, when most people stayed and chatted.
